Sermon Title: Solving Conflicts in Multicultural Church

Text: Acts 15; Galatians 1:6-9; 2:1-14; 3:1-2; 4:1-11; 5:2-3, 19-23

Auditorium Discussion Questions::

What are the conflicts and tensions that have built to this peak moment leading to the calling of the Jerusalem council? Try to capture it in your own words.

What are the corrections Paul is trying to bring to his Jewish & Gentile audiences?

Where are you tempted to believe a "different gospel" than salvation by grace, through faith, in Christ alone?

How can we be wise about the danger of wanting to make disciples of ourselves, our culture, or our values, rather than disciples of Jesus Christ?

Are there ways we might be making it harder, consciously or unconsciously, for those around us to come close to Jesus, to seek Him, to follow Him? Consider repenting and ask God to help us become people who remove obstacles rather than construct them.

Sanctuary Discussion Questions::

In Kevin's study notes he wrote, "One of the risks in church planting is that because of their spiritual immaturity, the new elders were more vulnerable than they might be later to being influence by unhealthy detours/deviations in doctrine and practice. What must have been Paul's worst case scenario had unfolded in these new church plants while Paul and Barnabas were Sabbath-Keeping in Antioch."

Please read the passages listed at the top of the page. What was "Paul's worst case scenario?" Has this "worst case scenario" ever been your experience? If so, please explain.

Kevin described the spiritual counter attack against the believers like this:

False believers Racism

Fear Broken relationships

Criticism Hypocrisy

Persecution Enslavement to "elemental spirits"

Has our spiritual enemy ever attacked you, your family or your worshiping community with any of these tactics? How do you respond? Was victory achieved? How?

The powerful influence of these "elemental spirits" (Gal. 4:3, 8-9) whether in the form of religious legalism or the principalities of darkness will always produce "the works of the flesh" (Gal. 19-21). Do you agree or disagree? Why?

Conversely, a healthy dependence on the One who justifies by faith will always produce the Fruit of the Spirit (Gal. 5:22-23).

If any group member is feeling enslaved by demonic power, will you pray for each other requesting a release from captivity and the renewing life of the spirit for these loved ones?
