SHARING STORY

Colossians 4:2-6; I Peter 3:15

- What was your life like before Jesus?
- How did you encounter and experience Jesus?
- What is your life like after you've met Jesus?

- Please read 1 Peter 3:8-17 and 4:1-11. What does the Spirit quicken in you in these passages?
- Is there anything here that encourages you in the sharing of your story with Jesus?
- As you review the diagram to the right, can you see why "direct, purposeful, personal experiences" are so vital in becoming one who represents Jesus well?
- Have you ever shared your story with Jesus? Where? When? With whom? The result?
- What can be cultivated within you so that you are empowered to BLESS by sharing your story with Jesus?
- Could you pray for each other in your group? Pray blessing, encouragement, opportunity, and a willingness to share.

- What was your favorite "story" as a child. How about as an adult? Why do you think these stories resonated with you?
- Tom talked about the different types of conflict inherent in every story. Which of these types of conflict most connected with your and your life story?
- Being a "witness" has often become synonymous with any number of systematic programs designed to explain God's plan of salvation (e.g. Four Spiritual Laws, The Bridge, Romans Road). These can certainly be useful tools, but how might Jesus' command to be a "witness" (e.g. giving personal testimony to what Jesus has done in your life) change the way you think of "witnessing"?
- Some individuals might be apt to say "I don't have a story." Do you think this is possible? What might motivate someone to think or believe this?
- Just as Paul succinctly shared the story of his life-changing encounter with Jesus (Acts 22 and Acts 26), would you be willing to bless the group by briefly sharing the story of how you encountered Jesus?
